<p>Organised indoor adult sport can restart, following rules on social contact and gathering limits.</p>	<p>Remaining outdoor entertainment can open, including outdoor performances.</p>	<p>Outdoor gathering limits will increase to 30 people. Indoor gatherings can take place in groups of two households or up to six people.</p>	<p>Some large events can go ahead with capacity limits – indoor events of 1,000 or 50%, outdoor seated events of 50,000 or 25%, other outdoor events of 4,000 or 50%.</p>

Stay Safe On Your Holiday

Police are urging tourists to follow some simple safety measures when enjoying the summer holiday period.

Devon, Cornwall, and the Isles of Scilly are amongst the safest places to visit in the country, but to help make holidaymakers' stay more enjoyable police recommend the following advice on how to keep themselves and their property safe.

Top three safety tips while on your holiday:

- Don't leave valuables in your vehicle and secure your vehicle when unattended
- Keep your mobile gadgets in a safe place
- Don't leave bags unattended

Other holiday safety tips include: secure your vehicle/caravan/room/tent and do not leave any valuables on display; keep your vehicle keys in a safe place; use personal safes where provided; never drink and drive; and finally be aware of speed limits and restrictions.

Iffracombe Police said: "We want everyone who visits this area, which is one of the safest places to live and visit, to enjoy their time here and look forward to coming back again. It only takes a few minutes to think about the safety advice offered. By taking these few simple steps visitors will reduce the opportunity of crime occurring and allow them to fully enjoy their holiday."

Do you know the signs of exploitation?



If a child is being exploited, we know it's really difficult for them to tell anyone. Children need the support of adults they trust before they can talk about their experiences. There are links to help with advice on how to support young people on our website.

We know offenders use social media to target and groom young people. We want children to be safe online so it's important that they have someone they can talk to if they have any problems.

Children who are being exploited online might not act in the way you would expect. Trauma can sometimes appear as challenging behaviour so it's important to look at the bigger picture.

Talking to children about online risks can be a really difficult conversation, but it's also a really important one. On our website you will find help and advice we have collected together to support you when talking to your children or children you care for.

Children or young people are *never* to blame for being exploited. Perpetrators take advantage of any vulnerability and victims can be boys or girls from any background. If it looks sus, tell us! 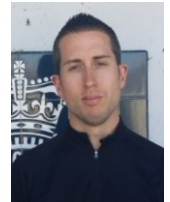
