


## IMPORTANT Coronavirus - COVID19 information

<u>Jo not leave home, if you or anyone in your</u> <u>household has symptoms.</u>



There are over 11,000 miles of British mainland coastline, and a complex network of estuaries, navigable rivers, coves, inlets, ports and harbours, all of which can be exploited by terrorists and serious criminals.

We want you to report any unusual or suspicious behaviour in these and other maritime environments. No matter how trivial it may seem; if it looks out of the ordinary, we want to know about it.

### How can you help us?

We want you to report any unusual or suspicious activity near the coastline and in maritime environments. This could include:

- Crew who show signs of nervousness or a lack of awareness of maritime protocols and customs.
- Vessels showing signs of unusual modification or minor damage.
- Increased activity at isolated coastal locations or at unusual times of the day.
- Attempts to signal to vessels offshore or guide them into an unusual location.
- Strange patterns of payment, such as large amounts of cash.
- People testing site security or an unusual interest in site structures and wharfs.

## What should you do?

If you see unusual or suspicious activity, report it to your local police on **101**, or anonymously to Crimestoppers on **0800 555 111**, and quote "**KRAKEN**".

If you want to anonymously report your information online, visit **www.crimestoppers-uk.org**.

Do not take direct action against any individuals or groups. If it is an emergency, **call 999**.



# **Theft from Motor** Vehicles

Devon and Cornwall Police are urging the public to be aware of opportunist thieves looking for valuables left in vehicles.

As lock down eases and we are all going out a bit more enjoying our beautiful area, please don't tempt the opportunist thief by leaving items of value on display or under coats on the back seat, be mindful of who might be observing you, and leave things out of site in the boot, do not place items under the seats, they usually can see part of them, remember that loose change you have for car park machines left on view, will also tempt someone to take that risk.

Before leaving your vehicle, take a second look, can you see anything? If so, move it. Your vehicle is a shop window to the opportunist thief.

Marking your property is an extremely effective method of deterring thieves from stealing your property.

If your property is clearly identified, it will be more difficult for the thief to sell and often reduces the value to the thief. Marking your property also increases the chances of having it returned to you in the event of it being lost or stolen.

Once you have marked your property, registering your property will help if you need to make an insurance claim or report a crime to the police, it also helps to combat the sale of stolen goods by alerting the second-hand trade of ownership through the unique markings you have put on vour property.

You can register your property for free on the website www.Immobilise.com This website is used by many police forces throughout the country to help identify the owner of lost and stolen goods.

Lambing Season has arrived, and we ask that care and attention is taken controlling your dog in and around areas with sheep.

Dogs by nature may want to play or chase livestock which may unwittingly cause harm.

Please be aware sheep worrying is an offence. It is legal for landowners to shoot dogs to protect their livestock, providing there was no other way of stopping the dog worrying their animals and they report the killing to the police within 48 hours.
